

***Digital Accreditation - The National Board for Technical Education (NBTE) Way: A Model for Other Tertiary Institutions in Nigeria***

In Nigeria, accreditation is particularly important due to the rapidly growing and diverse higher education sector (Ojediran & Olaniyi, 2022). The country has witnessed a significant expansion in the number of tertiary institutions, including universities, polytechnics, and colleges of education. Ensuring that these institutions maintain high standards is vital for the development of the nation's workforce and its overall socio-economic progress.

Globally, there has been a noticeable shift towards digital accreditation, driven by the need for efficiency, transparency, and adaptability in quality assurance processes (Eyo, 2015). The Fourth Industrial Revolution (4IR), characterized by advancements in digital technologies, has played a significant role in transforming various sectors, including education. Digital accreditation leverages these technologies to streamline the evaluation process, reduce the need for physical inspections, and enhance the accuracy and reliability of data (MDPI, 2022). This trend is not only a response to technological advancements but also to the challenges posed by traditional accreditation methods, such as high costs, logistical issues, and the potential for human error or bias (Adekunle, 2022). By embracing digital tools, accrediting bodies can conduct assessments more frequently and consistently, thereby ensuring that institutions continuously meet required standards.

The National Board for Technical Education (NBTE) in Nigeria is a regulatory body tasked with overseeing the quality of technical and vocational education and training (TVET) institutions across the country. Established in 1977, the NBTE's primary objective is to ensure that Nigerian technical institutions meet internationally recognized standards of education and training. In recent years, the NBTE has embarked on a significant digital transformation initiative aimed at modernizing its accreditation processes (NBTE, 2024a). This shift is part of a broader strategy to align Nigeria's technical education sector with global best practices and to enhance the quality and competitiveness of its graduates.

The NBTE's transition to digital accreditation represents a landmark development in Nigeria's education sector. Beginning in August 2024, the board fully transitioned from traditional physical accreditation methods to a completely digital system. This move was driven by the need for a more efficient, effective, and transparent process that could better meet the demands of the rapidly evolving education landscape. The digital accreditation initiative involves several key components, including the use of digital platforms for the submission and evaluation of accreditation materials, online monitoring of institutions, and the deployment of digital tools for data analysis and reporting (NBTE, 2024b). These innovations have significantly reduced the time and cost associated with the accreditation process while also improving the accuracy and consistency of evaluations.

The NBTE's digital accreditation model has had a profound impact on technical and vocational institutions in Nigeria. The initiative has been praised for its ability to enhance transparency and accountability, as well as for its role in promoting a culture of continuous improvement among institutions. By providing real-time feedback and facilitating ongoing monitoring, the digital system encourages institutions to maintain high standards throughout the accreditation cycle, rather than merely preparing for periodic reviews. Furthermore, the success of the NBTE's digital accreditation system has broader implications for other tertiary institutions in Nigeria. The system also includes e-learning platforms integrated with Learning Management Systems (LMS), facilitating more effective monitoring and assessment of institutions in real-time (Edugist, 2024). This move aligns with the global shift towards leveraging technology in education, a necessity driven by the demands of the Fourth Industrial Revolution and the Nigerian government's digitalization goals.

### **Key components of the Digital Accreditation System**

Issues such as digital literacy among staff, the initial costs of setting up the digital infrastructure, and the need for continuous updates to the system have posed significant hurdles. However, NBTE has addressed these challenges through extensive training programmes for its staff and collaboration with technology partners like Huawei and Cisco, ensuring that the system remains robust and scalable.

Looking forward, NBTE aims to further enhance its digital platform by incorporating more advanced data analytics and AI capabilities. These advancements will allow for even more precise monitoring and evaluation of educational institutions, ensuring that Nigeria's technical education system remains at the forefront of global standards. NBTE's digital accreditation system is a pioneering initiative that sets a benchmark for other tertiary institutions in Nigeria. Many educators, administrators, and students lack the necessary skills to fully engage with these technologies. Training programmes that include workshops and continuous professional development are essential to address this issue. Such

stakeholder engagement ensures smoother transitions and more effective implementation of digital accreditation (Bellwether, 2020). Collaborative efforts also encourage transparency and create a sense of shared responsibility, which increases the likelihood of achieving desired outcomes in education systems (Education Links, 2024).

5. Pilot programmes and phased implementation: Before a full-scale rollout, pilot programmes can be an effective way to identify challenges and areas for improvement. These programmes provide critical insights into the functionality and effectiveness of the digital accreditation system, allowing for refinements prior to broader implementation. A phased approach—starting with select departments—helps mitigate risks by ensuring that key components of the system are fully operational before expanding to other areas (Bellwether, 2020).

6. Continuous monitoring and evaluation: Finally, continuous monitoring and evaluation are essential to ensure that the digital accreditation system remains effective and relevant. Institutions should establish clear key performance indicators (KPIs) to regularly assess the performance of their digital accreditation systems. This iterative process contributes to both the sustainability and effectiveness of the system (Education Links, 2024).

By focusing on these strategic areas, tertiary institutions in Nigeria can successfully implement digital accreditation systems that are robust, secure, and aligned with international standards. This will not only enhance the quality of education but also position Nigeria as a leader in digital transformation within the education sector.

### **Potential challenges and solutions in implementing digital accreditation**

The shift towards digital accreditation in Nigerian tertiary institutions, particularly under the leadership of the National Board for Technical Education (NBTE), marks a significant step forward in modernizing education and quality assurance processes. However, this transition is not without its challenges. Understanding these potential obstacles and developing strategic solutions is critical to ensuring the successful implementation and sustainability of digital accreditation systems across the country.

#### **1. Technological infrastructure and digital divide**

One of the foremost challenges in implementing digital accreditation is the disparity in technological infrastructure across different regions in Nigeria. Many institutions, especially those in rural or underserved areas, may lack the necessary technological resources, such as reliable internet access, modern computing facilities, and adequate power supply, to fully engage with a digital accreditation system. This digital divide can lead to unequal access to

accreditation processes, ultimately affecting the quality and equity of education provided across the country.

To address this issue, the government and educational stakeholders need to invest in improving digital infrastructure across the nation. This includes expanding broadband access to rural and underserved areas, providing subsidies or grants to institutions for purchasing necessary technology, and establishing partnerships with private sector companies to enhance digital capabilities. Additionally, mobile-based solutions and offline functionalities within the digital accreditation system can be developed to accommodate institutions with limited internet access. Research by Aluko and Gbadebo (2021) highlights the importance of aligning institutional efforts with government policies for improved infrastructure in education.

## 2. Capacity building and digital literacy

Many educators and administrators may not be familiar with digital tools and platforms, leading to resistance or challenges in effectively using the new system. Moreover, there may be a general lack of digital literacy among students and faculty, which can hinder the successful adoption of digital processes.

Comprehensive training and capacity-building programmes are essential to equip staff and students with the necessary digital skills. The NBTE and other educational bodies should organize workshops, online courses, and hands-on training sessions to familiarize users with the digital accreditation system. Furthermore, creating a support system, such as help desks or online forums, can provide ongoing assistance to users as they navigate the new system. This approach not only facilitates smoother transitions but also builds confidence in the use of digital tools. Onah et al. (2023) and Eyo (2015) underscore the need for training programmes that focus on digital literacy to ensure a smooth transition to digital accreditation systems.

## 3. Data security and privacy concerns

With the move to digital platforms, data security and privacy become major concerns. The digital accreditation system will handle a vast amount of sensitive information, including academic records, personal details of students and staff, and institutional data. Ensuring the security of this data against cyber threats, unauthorized access, and breaches is critical to maintaining the integrity of the accreditation process.

Implementing robust cybersecurity measures is crucial to safeguarding the digital accreditation system. This includes the use of encryption, multi-factor authentication,

regular security audits, and compliance with data protection regulations. Institutions should also establish clear guidelines and protocols for data handling, ensuring that all stakeholders are aware of best practices in data security. Additionally, partnerships with cybersecurity firms can help in monitoring and addressing potential threats in real-time. Institutions should also comply with data protection regulations, as discussed by Ojediran and Olaniyi (2022), who emphasize the role of clear guidelines and protocols in safeguarding institutional data.

#### 4. Financial constraints

The transition to digital accreditation requires significant financial investment, both for setting up the necessary infrastructure and for maintaining and upgrading the system over time. Many institutions, particularly public ones with limited budgets, may find it challenging to allocate sufficient funds for these purposes.

Aluko and Gbadebo (2021) suggest that cost-sharing models between institutions and external partners could help reduce the financial burden. To mitigate financial constraints, the government can provide financial assistance or incentives to institutions that adopt the digital accreditation system. This can come in the form of grants, low-interest loans, or tax breaks. Additionally, institutions can explore cost-sharing models, such as forming consortia with other institutions to share the costs of digital infrastructure and services. Encouraging partnerships with private sector companies and international organizations can also bring in additional funding and resources.

#### 5. Resistance to change

Change management is another significant challenge, as the shift to digital accreditation represents a fundamental change in how accreditation and quality assurance are conducted. Resistance may come from various stakeholders, including institutional leadership, faculty, and administrative staff, who may be comfortable with the traditional methods and skeptical of the new system.

Effective change management strategies are crucial to overcoming resistance. This involves clear communication of the benefits of digital accreditation, involvement of all stakeholders in the planning and implementation process, and providing adequate support during the transition. Leadership within institutions must champion the digital accreditation initiative, demonstrating its importance and aligning it with the institution's broader goals. Additionally, phased implementation can help stakeholders gradually adapt to the new system, reducing resistance and allowing for adjustments based on feedback. Onah et al. (2023) highlight the importance of involving all stakeholders in the planning process to minimize resistance and ensure smooth adoption.

## 6. Sustainability and continuous improvement

Maintaining the digital accreditation system over the long term requires ongoing investment in technology, continuous training, and regular updates to keep pace with technological advancements and changing educational needs. Ensuring the sustainability of the system is a critical challenge.

To ensure sustainability, institutions should integrate the digital accreditation system into their long-term strategic plans, with dedicated budgets for maintenance and upgrades. Continuous professional development programmes should be institutionalized to keep staff updated on new technologies and processes. Moreover, regular feedback loops should be established, allowing for continuous improvement of the system based on user experiences and technological advancements. Collaboration with other institutions and stakeholders can also foster innovation and resource sharing, contributing to the long-term success of the digital accreditation system. Ojediran and Olaniyi (2022) argue that continuous training programmes and regular feedback loops are essential for keeping the system aligned with global best practices.

While the transition to digital accreditation presents several challenges, strategic planning, investment in technology and training, and a focus on security and sustainability can help overcome these obstacles. By addressing these challenges proactively, the NBTE and other tertiary institutions in Nigeria can fully realize the benefits of digital accreditation, leading to improved quality and accessibility of education across the country.
